
Shortgrass Prairie Region



The shortgrass prairie region includes the southwestern corner and Panhandle of Nebraska. This area is made up of short- to mixedgrass prairie and the Pine Ridge. The shortgrass prairie is the driest and warmest of the Great Plains grasslands.

This region receives an average of 12 -17 inches of rainfall annually and consists of buffalo grass and blue grama. The Pine Ridge is found in northwestern Nebraska and is dominated by ponderosa pine. More than 300 species of migratory and resident birds can be found in the shortgrass prairie region, as well as a variety of mammals, plants and other species.



Reptile and Amphibian Viewing Tips

- 1. Stay quiet and calm.
- 2. Use binoculars to get a closer look while keeping a respectful distance from wildlife.
- 3. Wash your hands before handling especially important for amphibians such as frogs, toads and salamanders.
- 4. Be patient.
- 5. Go to where the habitat is visit state parks and other public lands.
- 6. Do your homework learn what species live in the area.
- 7. Leave no trace leave wildlife in nature and nature the way you found it.

Western Hognose Snake

Heterodon nasicus Size: L: 15 - 25 in. **Description:** Stocky tan snake with darker blotches, dark underside, and an upturned scale on end of nose. **Diet:** Primarily toads and frogs Habitat: Sandhills, short- to mixedgrass prairie Viewing: Spring-summer, west to central



Prairie Lizard

Sceloporus consobrinus Size: L: 3.5 - 7.0 in. **Description:** Rough textured gray-tan lizard with gray dorsal stripe flanked on either side with light cream stripe. Diet: Insects Habitat: Prairie, rock outcrops Viewing: Spring-fall, western

Greater Short-horned Lizard

Phrynosoma hernandesi Size: L: 3 - 5 in. Description: Spiked scales on head and body, gray to tan with irregular blotches. **Diet:** Insects, especially

grasshoppers Habitat: Prairie, rock outcrops Viewing: Spring-fall, Panhandle

Size: L: 2 - 5 in. **Description:** Bumpy toad with light gray-tan, variable spotting, white back stripe, and white under with single dark spot on chest. Diet: Insects

Northern Leopard Frog

Lithobates pipiens Size: L: 2.0 - 4.5 in. Description: Spotted gray-brown to areen frog with light dorsal ridges and white belly. **Diet:** Insects and worms Habitat: Wet grasslands, semi-permanent pools and ponds Viewing: Spring-fall, north three-fourths

Bullfrog

Lithobates catesbeianus Size: L: 3.5 - 8.0 in. Description: Olive to lime green with some darker mottling, long hind legs, lighter belly. Diet: Insects and worms Habitat: Invasive, permanent ponds, lakes, etc. Viewing: Spring-fall, statewide

Western Tiger Salamander

Ambystoma mavortium Size: L: 6.0 - 8.5 in. **Description:** Dark with smooth slimy skin with yellow barring, short legs and a wide mouth. Diet: Insects and worms Habitat: Water or small mammal burrows Viewing: Spring-fall, statewide



Terrapene ornata Size: L: 4 - 6 in. (shell) Description: Brown with yellow markings, rounded shell, large front claws, and males have red eyes. Diet: Succulents, worms and small mammals Habitat: Prairie Viewing: Spring-fall, statewide except southeast

Snapping Turtle

Chelydra serpentina Size: L: 20 - 50 in. (shell) Description: Gray-brown water turtle with webbed toes, large head, and darker ridged shell. **Diet:** Fish and aquatic plants Habitat: Permanent bodies of water Viewing: Spring-fall, statewide



Prairie Rattlesnake

Crotalus viridis Size: L: 31 - 57 in. **Description: Venomous.** Tan with brown blotches, rattle on tail, cat's eye pupils, and pits near nostrils. **Diet:** Mainly small mammals Habitat: Short- to mixedgrass prairie Viewing: Spring-summer, western half

Plains Garter Snake

Thamnophis radix

Description: Coloration varies;

gray-green with black markings and

vellow stripe down center of back.

Diet: Small prey; amphibians, worms

Viewing: Spring-summer, statewide

Size: L: 20 - 28 in.

Woodhouse's Toad

Anaxyrus woodhousii

Habitat: Variable Viewing: Spring-fall, statewide



Bullsnake

Pituophis catenifer Size: L: 30 - 100 in. Description: Light yellow-tan with dark blotches. Acts like a rattlesnake when threatened by shaking tail in leaf litter to create rattle sound. **Diet:** Primarily rodents Habitat: Prairie, rocky outcrops Viewing: Spring-fall, statewide
